Lesson 1 - Traveling by air

Aviation

Aviation has allowed for people to travel quickly throughout the world.

In a matter of hours, we can fly from one city, one country or one continent to another. We can choose to go on holiday (vacation), live or work in different parts of the world. By travelling (UK spelling) or traveling (US spelling) to different places, we learn about how other people live, their lifestyles and their different cultures.

Let's speak English

In these ESL Conversational English classes on travel, we will continue to expand our student's vocabulary, teaching them how to use new vocabulary acquired in everyday English conversation.

We will revise English grammar previously taught.

Our students will take part in English dialogue with different people.

We will also have interesting English conversations while we travel around the world visiting different countries while we learn more about different countries and cities, their main tourist attractions, their people and their different cultures.

Vocabulary and Definitions

Let's learn some English naming words (nouns) to expand your vocabulary so that you can more easily talk about traveling by air in an aeroplane (UK English) or airplane (US English) or plane.

- aviation the making and flying of an aircraft that is heavier than air, e.g., airplanes, helicopters, drones etc.
- destination the place or country you are traveling to
- flight a journey through air or space in a vehicle such as a plane
- domestic flight when you are flying to a destination within the same country
- international flight when you are flying to another country
- departures the area of the airport for travellers flying to other destinations

- departure board all flights departing from the airport are displayed on the departure board. You can check on the departure board whether your flight will leave on time as scheduled, be delayed (leave at a later time) or whether your flight has been cancelled (will no longer leave as scheduled).
- baggage / luggage In UK English you can use with of these words when referring to your packed bags and suitcases that contain your clothing and things, however in US English luggage refers to empty bags and suitcases whereas baggage refers to packed bags and suitcases
- **bag wrapping** when you wrap your luggage in plastic wrap to protect your bags and belongings
- check in baggage or luggage packed bags and suitcases that are handed in at
 the check in counter to be weighed and checked in. Check in baggage or luggage
 goes into the cargo area (at the bottom of the plane) while you are flying. You
 collect your check in baggage or luggage after you land at the airport you are
 flying to.
- carry-on baggage or luggage packed bags which you carry on to the plane with you. You can store these in an overhead bin above where you are sitting on the plane.
- baggage allowance the maximum that your packed bag is allowed to weight
- check in counter this is where you hand over your packed bags to be weighed and checked in and also where you will receive your boarding pass
- airport staff (check in agents/passenger service agents) people who work in the airport, at the check in counters and at the boarding gates to assist travellers and to answer any questions travellers may have
- boarding pass a paper ticket that you show at the boarding gate when you
 need to board the plane the boarding pass will show the boarding gate, the
 boarding time and departure time of your flight and your seat number (where
 you are sitting on the plane).

- passport control this is where your passport is checked. After your passport is checked you proceed to the departure lounge
- security this is where they might check your personal items in your packed carry-on bags or suitcases to ensure that you are only taking items onto the plane that is within the airline regulations (rules)
- boarding or departure gate where you go to wait to board the plane
- boarding to board is to get onto the plane
- cabin crew the people who work for the airline and who are on the flight with you. When you board you will be welcomed by the flight attendants who will also serve you refreshments and meals, help you should you need assistance, answer any questions you may have and ensure your safety during your flight
- cockpit this is the area in the front of the plane where the pilots and co-pilots sit, to fly the plane
- arrivals the area of the airport where travellers flying in from other destinations arrive
- baggage carousel where you go to collect the packed bags you checked in before your flight

The student will read the part of the traveller.

Check in Agent

Good day and welcome to ESL airlines. Where will you be traveling to, today?

Traveller

Hi there. I am flying to Cape Town, South Africa.

Check in Agent

Can I see your passport and ticket please?

Traveller

Certainly.

Check in Agent

Thank you. I see you haven't booked your seat yet. Would you like a window or aisle seat?

Traveller

I would prefer a window seat please.

Check in Agent

Ok, let me check if there are still any window seats available.

Here we go. I can seat you at a window right over here. Would this be suitable for you?

Traveller

Yes, thank you. That's perfect.

Check in Agent

Will you be checking in any luggage?

Traveller

Yes, just this one suitcase please.

Check in Agent

Please can you place your suitcase over here on the scale?

Traveller - This suitcase is so heavy. I hope it's not overweight.

Check in Agent - Let's check.

No problem, you are within the baggage allowance weight.

Here is your boarding pass. You will be boarding at gate B2 and your flight will be leaving on time at 11:45am.

The boarding gates are over there. Please proceed through the boarding gates at least 30 minutes before the boarding time reflecting on your boarding pass.

Traveller - Great, thank you. Will my bag I have checked in go all the way to Cape Town or do I need to collect it and recheck it in before my connecting flight to Cape Town?

Check in Agent

Your luggage is checked in all the way to Cape Town so you don't need to worry. You can collect your luggage when you land in Cape Town.

Traveller

Thank you. That makes travelling so much easier.
